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The Perry County Health Department would like to thank the District Advisory Council (DAC) members that attended the DAC meeting held Wednesday March 12, 2025. The DAC meets annually in March as required by the Ohio Revised Code section 3709.03 and is made up of Perry County Township Trustees, Mayors, and County Commissioners. During the DAC meeting, members elect the DAC Chair and Secretary, make necessary appointments to the Board of Health, receive and consider the Perry County Health Department Annual Report or other special reports from the Board of Health, and make recommendations to the Board of Health and to the Health Department for the betterment of health within Perry County.

This year Chip Saxton, Pike Township Trustee was elected as the DAC Chair and Braxton Cannon, Clayton Township Trustee was elected as the DAC Secretary. During the meeting the DAC appointed Kyle Eveland as a Board of Health member, and he will serve a 5-year term. The DAC members also enjoyed staff presentations including a presentation on infectious diseases highlighting Avian Bird Flu (H5N1), Measles, and Lyme disease presented by Jenna Cannon, Director of Nursing and Epidemiologist. Deborah Raney, Director of Health Education and Grants Management, presented on health education and prevention, sharing how health education plays a crucial role in both disease and injury prevention while highlighting the services provided at the Health Department. Lastly, Cary Bowers, Director of Environmental Health, presented on the Construction and Demolition Debris (C&DD) Community Clean-up and Education Program, highlighting program accomplishments from 2024 and unveiling the new program guidelines for 2025. The 2026 DAC meeting is tentatively scheduled for March 11, 2026.
